City of Golden Land Acknowledgment

We begin by acknowledging the First Peoples, the Hinono'ei (Arapaho), Tsistsistas or Tsétséhéstáhese (Cheyenne) and Núuchiu (Ute), as the stewards and relatives of this ancestral territory that was seized from them in what is now known as Golden, Colorado. Dr. Tink Tinker (Wazhazhe, Osage Nation), Professor Emeritus, Iliff School of Theology

A citizen of the Osage Nation (wazhazhe), Tink Tinker is Emeritus Professor of American Indian Studies at Iliff School of Theology. As an American Indian academic teaching at a eurochristian school for training ministers, Tinker has always been committed to a scholarly endeavor that takes seriously both the liberation of Indian peoples from their historic oppression as colonized communities and the liberation of eurochristian americans, the historic colonizers and oppressors of Indian peoples, whose own history of violence has been largely suppressed.

A scholar/activist, Tinker has worked closely with both Four Winds American Indian Council in Denver and the American Indian Movement of Colorado. Under Tinker's leadership, Four Winds worked closely with the Rocky Mountain Synod (ELCA), who eventually donated the building to Four Winds. He has published several books and nearly a hundred chapters and journal articles. One journal article of some renown, because it was about his home institution, is: "Redskin, Tanned Hide: A Book of Christian History Bound in the Flayed Skin of an American Indian: The Colonial Romance, christian Denial and the Cleansing of a christian School of Theology," available online at the Iliff website. A follow-up article was "'Damn it, he's an Injun!' Christian Murder, Colonial Wealth, and Tanned Human Skin," The New Polis, January 21, 2019: http://thenewpolis.com/2019/01/21/damn-it-hes-an-injunchristian-murder-colonial-wealth-and-tanned-human-skin-tink-tinker-wazhazhe-udsethe/. Iliff is today trying to rectify its history of violence by inviting a delegation of Lenape elders to consult with the school about that history. Tink works very closely with that Lenape delegation. Tinker's current book project is a description of the radically disparate worldviews of eurochristians and American Indians.

Danielle SeeWalker is Húŋkpapȟa Lakȟóta and citizen of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe in North Dakota. She is a fine artist, muralist, writer, activist, and boymom of two, based in Denver, Colorado. Her visual artwork often incorporates the use of mixed media and experimentation while incorporating traditional Native American materials, scenes, and messaging. Her artwork pays homage to her identity as a Lakȟóta wíŋyaŋ (woman) and her passion to redirect the narrative to an accurate and insightful representation of contemporary Native America while still acknowledging historical events.

Alongside her passion for creating visual art, Danielle is a freelance writer and published her first book in 2020 titled, *Still Here: A Past to Present Insight of Native American People & Culture*. She is also very dedicated to staying connected and involved in her Native community and has served as a mayoral appointed City Commissioner for the Denver American Indian Commission since 2019. Danielle has also been working on a personal, passion project since 2013 with her long-time friend called The Red Road Project. The focus of the work is to document, through words and photographs, what it means to be Native American in the 21st century by capturing inspiring and positive stories of people and communities within Indian Country.


